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1. Introduction

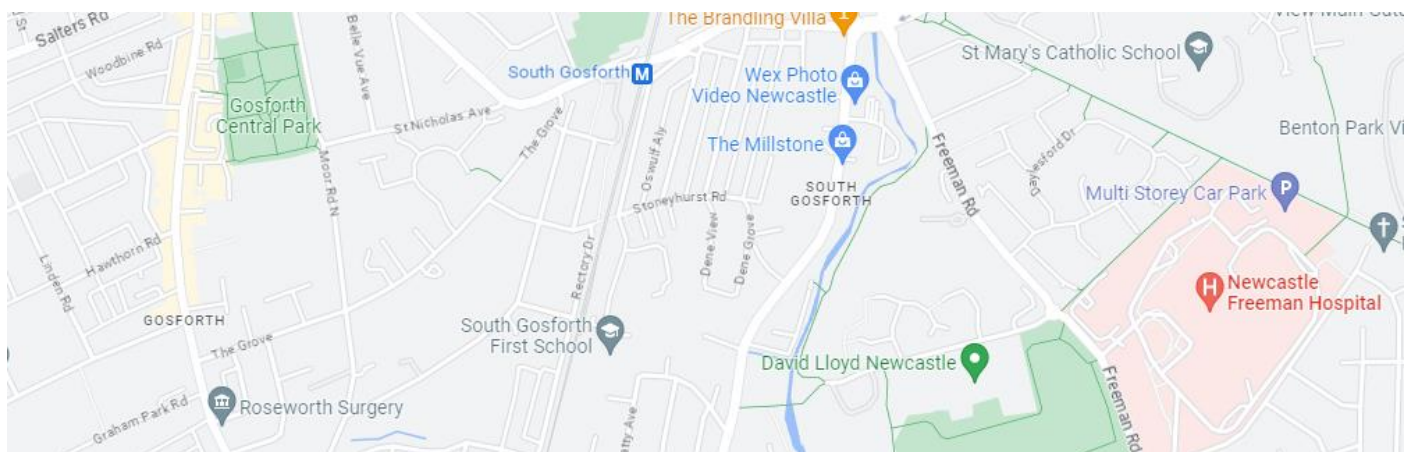
1.1 Background to South Gosforth First School

South Gosforth First School is located on Alnmouth Drive, Newcastle Upon Tyne, NE3 1YF. It is located on the roadside at the end of a quiet residential cul-de-sac. There is some parking on the road and there are no permit restricted zones in the locality. The school is approximately 7 minutes walk from South Gosforth Metro Station which has access to both metro links.

The school has approximately 330 pupils aged 3-9 years, drawn from an increasingly local catchment area.

Parents are actively encouraged to bring their child to school by walking or on bike/scooter and we hold wheeled play days across the week for each year group to help encourage this.

There are 20 staff/visitor parking spaces in a carpark at the front of the school, this is not to be used by parents unless by prior arrangement. There are 2 designated disabled parking spaces.



1.2 Reasons for developing a School Travel Plan

South Gosforth First School has developed a School Travel Plan in order to:

- Ensure that pupils, parents, teachers and governors recognise the absolute need to ensure that the personal safety of children is maintained whilst making the daily journey to and from school
- Promote a more healthy lifestyle for our children
- Reduce the number of car journeys to and from school
- Promote South Gosforth First School as a responsible neighbour

1.3 Local Issues

The following list of traffic related issues has been identified as key factors affecting safety in the vicinity of the school.

- Danger of road traffic accident due to narrow street entrance to cul-de-sac and back entrance gate on Beatty Avenue due to parked cars
- Dangers from high flow of traffic on Station Road

2.0 Overview & Current Travel Patterns

2.1 Overview

South Gosforth First School takes part in transport surveys to establish the travel patterns of pupils attending the school.

In recent years we have worked with Mode Shift Stars at Newcastle City Council to ensure increasing numbers of children travel to school on foot or by cycle/scooter.

Over 25% of pupils regularly travel by bike or scooter and a further 32% walk to school. The rest of the children use transport to attend.

Previous surveys have been designed to:

- Measure levels of car usage linked to the school run
- Determine the preferred mode of school travel.

All parents accompany children travelling to school, even on the shortest journeys.

3.0 Objectives and targets

1. To work within the Gosforth Schools' Trust to ensure we build a united travel policy working at ensuring all of our children are safe across all the schools in our cluster
2. To reduce car trips in favour of a shift towards walking, biking/scooting and public transport.
3. To ensure that pupils and parents are aware of the full range of travel options and the important health benefits to be gained from a more active lifestyle.
4. To forge closer links with local residents and maintain good community relations.

It is important that School Travel Plans are not perceived as a one-off treatment but rather as an ongoing investment in the local community requiring continual review and commitment to ensure the long term integrity of the plan.

4. Action Plan

The Action Plan sets out a list of proposed actions that will be taken to meet the objectives identified above. Each action has clear responsibilities, priorities and time scales. For any physical measures, an education action (something for pupils) and a promotional action (something for parents and carers) has been included where appropriate.

Objective: To introduce a 'school safety zone' in the vicinity of South Gosforth First School Target: Work with the Local Authority Transport Planning Team to complete redevelopment work around the school building and surrounding area down Alnmouth Drive to ensure that pupils and families are safe on their journeys to and from school

Objective: To maintain the current split of walk, bus and car trips to the school and in the longer term seek to reduce car trips in favour of a shift towards walking, cycling and public transport.

Target: Maintain or increase current levels of walking and reduce car use. Promote use of cycling by providing safe storage for cycles and scooters.

5.1 Management

The Plan will be initially prepared and agreed by the approved Working Group. Where appropriate group members to include:

- Facilitator
- Teachers
- Parent and School Governors
- Parents
- Pupils
- Caretaker
- Residents
- Ward Councilors
- Police
- Nexus
- Local Authority - Traffic and Road Safety Officers, Education Officers, Community Coordinator, School Crossing Patrols

The Group will be responsible for the ongoing support and development of the document with particular focus on the Action Plan. The School Travel Plan document will be reviewed in light of any new developments in the school or as part of new national educational initiatives

The group will pledge commitment to the principles and long term aims of the action plan and will:

- Set objectives
- Planning and implementation
- Monitor progress
- Act on results of monitoring
- Revise plans and objectives if necessary
- Agree a date for the next meeting (2 a year as a minimum)

The Group will also monitor pupil travel needs following any new developments with in the school and the Local Education Authority.

5.2 Monitoring

Time will be spent each term to monitor progress against the objectives. Progress will be reported to the school community each term in school newsletters. Additionally, the working group will be invited to attend the termly site visit and will have the opportunity to monitor the progress first hand.

Changes in pupils' mode of travel will be monitored using the annual School Census return and ongoing surveys.
